The Winnipeg Police Department Motorcycle Corps

Prior to WW1, Winnipeg was the third largest city in the Dominion. It had the nickname, Chicago of the North. The city was growing rapidly and it was said that there were more millionaires per capita than in most big cities of Canada. The Manitoba Motorcycle Club was still a year away from being formed.

On April 10, 1910, the Winnipeg Police Board of Commissioners created a committee to purchase motorcycles after seeing a demonstration of the Indian motorcycle. Soon after, the Board approved the purchase of six new Indian motorcycles. They were two-cylinder, 7HP machines with only high & low speeds, magneto ignition and a speedometer. Each one cost \$475.00. They were manufactured by the Hendee Manufacturing Company, and supplied by the Consolidated Bicycle & Motor Company located at 185 Notre Dame Avenue East.

The motorcycles were assigned to a specific police officer for use in a particular patrol area:

Const. Walker was issued one of these motorcycles on 10/April/1911 but there is no identification as to which one it was. On May 22, 1912, one motorcycle was traded in and marked as burnt. Another motorcycle was traded in and marked as dismantled on May 31, 1912. On January 10, 1913, four motorcycles were traded in for \$245.00 (three were valued at \$70.00 each and one was \$35.00).

By 1908, cars and motorcycles were abundant in Manitoba, hence the need for provincial organization and licensing. The government passed legislation creating the Motor Vehicle Act. From 1908 to 1910, the operator of a motorized vehicle would be issued a registration certificate indicating the name of the owner, the type of vehicle, and a registration number. Also issued was a two-inch circular aluminum disc, numbered to match the registration certificate. This was to be placed on the rear mud guard in the case of a motorcycle. The owner would be required to make their own license plate, the number of which was to be the same as the registration number. Both car and motorcycle license plates were to be black numbers on white background.

In 1911, a three-inch oval disc was issued, and by the summer of that year, the government introduced the first pair of license plates for automobiles. Motorcycles, however, had to continue with the homemade plates until 1912.

According to the June 1911 edition of the *Gas Power Age* magazine, there were approximately 265 motorcycles registered in Manitoba. The City of Winnipeg Police Department sported license plate numbers 65 through 70.

A photograph of the Indian motorcycles, purchased in 1910, found its way into the 1912 advertising catalogue produced by the Indian Motocycle Company of Springfield, Massachusetts, the world's largest motorcycle producer at the time. Page 7 of the catalogue shows the photograph of five of the six Winnipeg motorcycles on parade (according to long-time police museum advocate, Jack Templeman, this might have been taken at St. John's Park on Main Street the summer of 1911). If one looks closely at the front of the first machine, a small homemade license plate indicates number 66 which matches the provincial records for the registered motorcycles of the police department for 1911. The Winnipeg Police Department would be one of the earliest to create a motorcycle corps in North America, still serving a vital role today, some 110 years later.

I would like to thank Randy James, past curator of the Winnipeg Police Museum, and Jack Templeman, author of Winnipeg police history and museum volunteer. Miraculously, they were able to find some of this original purchase data in the City of Winnipeg records. If you haven't visited the Winnipeg Police Museum, put it on your bucket list as many consider it the best police museum in North America. It is located at 245 Smith Street (long-time Winnipeggers will remember this site as the former Winnipeg Post office).
